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1.INTRODUCTION

Students of Indian classical performing arts spend years learning the art form and perfecting the art through rigorous practice to perform the 'Arangetram' or the formal initiation of the student to perform on stage. This preparation of the student can take six to seven years and if the same students were to pursue academic studies during that time, they would be able to complete post graduate collegiate education. However, in the pursuit of learning performing arts, students are not awarded academic degrees or certifications for their accomplishments. In an effort to reward students for their efforts Alagappa Performing Arts Academy based in California, USA and Chennai, India in collaboration with Alagappa University, Karaikudi, Tamil Nadu, India has developed a novel structured learning program wherein students of performing arts can obtain a degree in these arts, namely

- Bachelor's degree in Performing Arts (Bharathanatyam)
- Bachelor's degree in Performing Arts (Vocal Music)
- Bachelor's degree in Performing Arts (Instrumental Music)

2. ALAGAPPA PERFORMING ARTS ACADEMY (APAA)

APAA, an integral part of the Alagappa group of institutions founded in 2005 by Mr. Ramanathan Vairavan, the grandson of Dr. RM. Alagappa Chettiar has designed a comprehensive curriculum in performing arts to demonstrate the repertoire of culture that is embedded in these classical arts. These structured learning programs have been designed with specific course work and practicals that a student has to successfully complete to get the respective certification. Effective detailed aids have been developed to enhance the learning process with the comprehensive review of the various aspects of the art. From an overview of the various dances in India, to the rudiments of dancing, to clearly depicting the exquisite language of gestures, postures and rhythmical delivery, a student is guided through the various phases of this intricate art with textbooks that concisely explain its relevance and interactive DVDs that vividly describe the precise execution of the art. These valuable learning aids enhance comprehension and make this a valuable exercise for students to understand the depth and versatility of this art with theory and practicals integrated in a format similar to academic programs.

With the primary focus now on Bharathanatyam, other classical dance forms of India such as Mohini Attam, Odissi, Kuchipudi, Kathak and Manipuri will be added on later. Similarly for Vocal and Instrumental Music valuable learning aids have been developed that enhance the comprehension and enable students to understand the depth and versatility of these arts with theory and practicals integrated in a format similar to University affiliated academic programs.

These programs are offered through APAA Authorized Certification Centers (APACs) worldwide to enable students to obtain undergraduate and post graduate degrees in performing arts. The vision of APAA is to obtain accreditation for this program from renowned Universities in the world, propagate and bring prominence not only to Indian performing arts but also to all other dance and music art forms by offering structured learning programs to students worldwide. The World Educational Service has recognized and given college credit to students who have completed the APAA programs successfully.

3. ALAGAPPA UNIVERSITY

The Alagappa University owes its existence to its founder, Dr. RM. Alagappa Chettiar, a successful business entrepreneur, who was knighted by the British Government in 1945 at the age of 37 and was conferred the distinction of Padma Bhushan by the Indian Government on January 26, 1956. In 1947, answering Prime Minister Nehru's call to industrialists to help educate India, he acquired a thousand acre parcel of land in his native place, Karaikudi. Within a span of two decades, he demonstrated his versatility as a successful business tycoon, an intrepid academician with a vision to change the mere scrub jungle of Karaikudi to an impressive galaxy of educational institutions. 4. APAA ACADEMIC PROGRAMS

4.1. Program in Performing Arts (Dance – Bharathanatyam)

This program is structured for students of Bharathanatyam to learn the theoretical aspects of this dance form in parallel to the practical aspects. A student will be able to progress stepwise through various phases to obtain a degree which could be completed in 4- 6 years as follows:

This Program is introduced for the beginners from the age group of 5 years above and upto 7 years .The syllabus enables them to understand the foot movements and the hand movements with simple slokas.

4.1.3 Certificate in Performing Arts (Bharathanatyam)

This program provides an overview of the fundamental concepts of Bharathanatyam and a historical perspective of the ancient origin of this dance form. The rudimentary concepts of Nritha, Nritthya and Natya are explained. The student will learn about the types of instruments used in Bharathanatyam and understand basic dancing "parlance". In addition, students will be exposed to "adavu" (the basic footsteps). A student will be required to perform "charis" (movement of single foot), "bhedas" (movements) "Asamyutha hasthas" (hand gestures) one hand and double hand. Students enrolled in this program will take 1 to 3 years to complete the program. To complete this program successfully a student must complete all the courses stated below:

History of Bharathanatyam, Repertoire of Bharathanatyam, Technical Concept of Bharathanatyam, Treatises on Bharathanatyam, Usage of gestures by single hand in detail

This includes the basic exercises for flexibility, 19 types of Adavus and combination of Korvais, hasthas both single and double in full, movements of head, neck and eyes.

CEB 02 Fundamentals of Bharathanatyam – Theory

Covered in this course are: Elements of Abhinaya, essential qualities of Bharathanatyam, comprehensive review of hasthas, usage of double hand gestures in detail, relevance of Bharathanatyam in present context.

4.1.4 Associate Degree in Performing Arts (Bharathanatyam)

This program covers the basic and essential expressions in Bharathanatyam. Abhinaya its usage and importance are explained. Students will realize the enduring and enthralling beauty of Bharathanatyam in Alarippu (an invocation) Kavithuvam and Shabdam (traditional dance with a brief introduction of Bhava) manifested in various Gaits (walking patterns), different varieties of Alarippu, Jathiswaram (combination of notes with Bharathanatyam steps), Keerthana and Kavadichindu. Students enrolled in this program will take 1 year to complete after obtaining their Certificate. To complete this program successfully a student must complete all the courses stated below:

4.2. Program in Performing Arts (Instrumental Music)

Students should be at least 16 years of age to obtain a degree

5. PROGRAM ELIGIBILITY

A student must be 10 years of age to enroll in the program. Students should be able to read and comprehend the prescribed textbooks and write their exams independently. In special cases on recommendation of APAC where a student is less than 10 years of age and has demonstrated the ability to comprehend the prescribed textbook a student may be admitted to the program. APAA will review and reserve the right to admit any student. A student must be at least 16 years of age to obtain a bachelor degree.

6. APAA AUTHORIZED CENTERS (APAC)

APAA Academic programs are offered through established dance or music academies that are directed or administered by accomplished dancers and termed as Alagappa Performing Arts Academy Authorized Certification Centers (APAC's). These centers are at first evaluated for their accomplishments and competence in teaching this art. Once they fulfill the required criteria they are accredited and authorized to offer the APAA programs.

6.1 Student Enrollment

Interested students can enroll in the APAA programs by completing the forms on line or by completing the downloadable forms on the website www.alagappaarts.com To obtain University certification all students should begin with the Certificate program. Students should submit their applications along with their photo and proof of birth certificate.

(Appendix 1).

- Once the application forms are received by APAA along with payments for the corresponding tuition fees, students will be assigned a Student ID.
- Once a student enrolls, the APAC should update the Student Profile Master (Appendix 1) to inform APAA immediately of the new enrolment.
- APAA will send study materials either directly to students or to APAC for distribution as per the suggestion of the APAC. Each course generally has three components. The theory portion is identified as 01 and 02 and the practical portion as P1 and P2, and a researched written project

6. 2 Functions of APAC

- APAC teachers should highlight and teach the essential aspects of the theory and performing art.
- APAC can supplement the study materials given by APAA with additional noncontradictory material to enhance the learning process.
- APAC should conduct quarterly and mid-term exams. Final examinations for all courses will be set and corrected by the University.
- To fulfill the practical component of the program a DVD of the student's performance for the academic program must be recorded by the APAC and sent to APAA.
- APAC should maintain a folder for every student that should contain an attendance register; student's answer papers for the examinations and relevant information on the student. A copy should be provided to APAA for final grading and assessment of student's performance.

6.3 Theory For Students Of Bharathanatyam

- APAC should dedicate at least three quarters of the scheduled student's time for practical and one quarter for theory. The first one third of the book for Quarterly, the second one third will be for midterm, and the last one third for the final.
- APAC are recommended to conduct theory classes for all levels of students together so that time schedules for exams can be maintained.
- APAC should conduct weekly tests for students from the syllabus. Sample
- Questions from APAA are also available on the website. The required syllabus must be completed before students appear for the final examinations for all the courses.

6.4 Practical Classes

- APACs are free to follow their own dance style or adopt the style recommended by APAA for the practical classes.
- APAC can schedule separate classes for regular and fast track students to complete the prescribed syllabus by APAA. The APAC is free to charge the students for extra classes taken.
- Girls should wear salwar kameez or a short saree and boys should wear kurtha and Pyjama.

6.5 Internal Examination and Student Attendance

Each student in general should attend at least one class of I to 5 hrs / week to complete the respective courses within the prescribed time frame. Each class shall be taken as a unit for the purpose of calculating attendance. No student shall be eligible to move to the next course unless they have passed the previous examination as prescribed by regulations.

6.6 Syllabus

- The syllabus shall be updated by APAA / University on an as needed basis.
- The Advisory Board shall periodically review the syllabus and recommend such changes as it considers necessary.

7. Fast Track Program

- The FAST Track Program has been set up to enable students who have prior knowledge in Bharathanatyam to obtain rapid certification (Certification and Associate Degree).
- A student enrolled in the fast track program can appear for the certificate exam 3 months from the date of enrollment of the certificate program. On completion of the certificate and application of the Associate program the student can appear for the exams 3 months of the date of enrollment to the Associate program. This is permitted within a 12 month period.
- A mandatory 1 year is required from the date of enrollment to complete the Diploma program.

8 EXAMINATION SYSTEM (In person & On line)

- Each student will evaluate on a quarterly, midterm and a final basis. All questions will relate to the syllabus and contents based on the text books provided.
- The exams which will test the theoretical aspect will be offered in a multiple choice format, fill in the blanks, Match the following, Short answers and long answers with a duration of 1½ hrs for Certificate, 2 hrs for Associate Degree , 2½ hrs for Diploma and 3 hrs for Degree program.
- APAA / University will additionally conduct a Skype based exam to evaluate the students in knowledge in theory and practical.
- APAC will send the list of students appearing for the examination one month prior to the final exam date.
- The Examination in each paper shall be for a maximum of one hundred marks. All courses for each program will be graded and the student will be provided a final grade for each program.

8.1 Testing Process

8.1.1 In Person

- Students should produce their practical test requirement in front of a proctor in a video or in DVD format and submit it to APAA.
- Students can perform either based on their original styles taught by the dance center or from what they learn from the DVDs. Any one dance scorefrom the DVD is compulsory for Certificate; any two dance items from the DVD is compulsory for the Associate, Diploma and Degree Programs.
- The DVDs should be forwarded to APAA for evaluation and grading.

8.1.2 On-line

- Students appearing for exams online will be notified in advance on the time and date of exam by email and through APAC.
- Students would be required to log in with the username and password and access the exam
- The exam will be a timed offering during which student should answer all questions within prescribed time limits.
- Sample test are available online for student to practice.

8.2 Guidelines For Theory Exams

- APAC should announce the topic prior to the theory class, so that the students can come prepared to discuss the topics.
- Theory chapters that have practical to be done could be covered during the regular classes. Theory questions will be based on contents from text books
- Final exams will be a more comprehensive format.
- The project papers and DVDs should be submitted together.

8.3 Guide Lines For APAA Practical Examinations

- All prescribed dance scores for each program should be recorded in one DVD properly labeled with the student's name and id and sent to APAA
- The quality of the music should be good, for evaluation purposes
- Performance with Sorkattus or with music can be presented.
- The recording should be made with adequate lighting to understand expressions.

- The dancer should perform each dance score completely.
- The preferable costume is short saree or salwar kameez for girls, kurtha & pyjama for boys. Waist belt / dupatta should be tied around the waist, hair groomed well
- It is compulsory for students to wear Salangai (bells)

8.4. Guidelines for APAA Project papers

- Hand gestures must be distinct, well trained and communicative in Abhinayam. Talam, Layam is compulsory.
- Presentation, Total involvement, Steadiness, Swiftness well emphasized

11. FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

VALUE OF APAA PROGRAMS TO THE STUDENT

What is the Value of getting certification from this program?

Students of performing arts spend years learning the art and perfecting the practices and mostly perform the "Arangetram" which is a graduation performance. This process might typically take about 6 to 7 years for a student. If a student were to pursue studies during this time, they should be able to complete postgraduate studies. However in the pursuit of learning Bharathanatyam, dancers are not awarded degrees or receive certifications for their accomplishments.

To reward students for their efforts, APAA has designed a comprehensive curriculum in Bharathanatyam along with Alagappa University in India, to offer step-wise certification programs to meet the students' needs. The Alagappa University certification certainly enhances the student's achievements and credentials while applying to universities for collegiate education.

Is this certification given only by Alagappa University from India or is it affiliated with universities in the USA as well?

Currently the degrees are given through Alagappa University. However we are working with the US department of Education to get the program accredited. We are actively seeking affiliation with established US universities. We hope to receive the affiliation soon.

What is the value of accreditation to US universities?

Accreditation from a US University means perhaps obtaining credits towards a degree that the student has applied for. It shows recognition of the student's hard work over the past years learning an art as a past time. Certification from Alagappa University makes the student's portfolio more impressive.

What types of learning aids are supplied?

On enrollment in a specific program: Specific text books will be provided that elaborate on the various concepts and techniques. Additionally interactive DVDs are provided to enhance the practical aspects studied through the books. The DVDs vividly describe the precise execution of this art and provide a valuable aid to help students practice what they have learnt at the dance centers.

Is a particular dance style forced onto students who join the course?

The Curriculum has been designed in cooperation with a group of eminent dance teachers with varied dance styles. Therefore no particular style is forced on the student.

What are the roles of APAA Authorized Certification Centers (APAC)?

To provide training and guidance to enrolled students to fulfill requirements of the respective program that they have enrolled in. The APAC will also help students prepare for the examinations, proctor examinations, record a DVD the respective practical exams and send to APAA for evaluation.

Can a student withdraw from a course after enrollment?

If a student withdraws from a course <u>no refund will be provided</u>. If a student does not rejoin a course within a one year period, registration has to be completed again.

What are the requirements to enroll in the Certificate program?

Enrollment in the Certificate Program is open to all students, but to obtain a Certificate within one year a student would be required to have 2 to 3 years prior experience in Bharathanatyam, as the practical requirement for the Certificate program requires knowledge in specific dance routines such as Alarippu, Kavithuvam and Shabdam.

Can a student register for the Degree program directly if he / she have completed Arangetram?

No, in accordance with University guidelines a student is required to complete and pass all the required courses in the Certificate Program and then complete the same in the Associate Degree Program.

To acknowledge time spent learning the art and staging an Arangetram, students are permitted to take the courses on a FAST TRACK basis so that they can complete the Certificate and the Associate Degree in a shorter time period (for example in 6 months)

On successful completion of the coursework, which includes all theory exams, a student will be accepted in to the Diploma program and will be exempt from practical work provided they are able to demonstrate knowledge of the required practical work for the Certificate and Associate Degree programs

Where are the programs offered?

The APAA programs are offered though APAA Authorized centers (APAC), which have been previously evaluated by APAA based on their stringent guidelines and certified to offer the program. All such centers are stated and updated on the APAA website www.alagappaarts.com on a regular basis.

Who will teach the textbook material?

Dance Centers (APACs) will set up a study outline. It is up to the students to interact with the dance center and complete the study materials before the exams. Any questions can be asked to the teachers in the dance center or the students can ask questions online and our professional staff will respond to queries.

Can I get the model question papers?

Yes, sample questions have been sent on the APAA website to provide students a flavor of questions that will be asked in the exams. User ID, you can login and access to the sample questions.

If we relocate to another city are the credits transferable?

As long as the students decide to stay within the APAA system, all the credits are transferable to APAA authorized dance centers all over the country. It is our fervent goal to establish authorized dance centers in all the major cities.

I am not able to complete the practical for the Certificate course in 1 year? What do I do?

For students who are not able to complete the dances within the 1 year time period, they can work with the dance center at a slower pace and complete the requirements.

What if I don't want to pay for the DVD's in each of the courses?

The DVD's are mandatory. It is part of the coursework and it provides a basic outline of what is required of students in the practical exams. Any one dance score should be performed from the DVD for certificate and Associate program and any two dance scores should be performed for Diploma and Degree Program.

Can students who have learned for 7-10 years and those who have received grade 7 certificate go straight to diploma and degree program? \

Yes that is possible and will be considered on an individual basis. All tuition fees should still be paid completely.

Can students who have learned for 5-10 years and done Arangetram go straight to diploma and degree but again still pay the full amount.

The current procedure is that those students who have done their Arangetram can join the fast track and complete their Certificate and Associate degree in 6 months and then enroll for the diploma.

If one has all above documentation and number of credit hours and paid the full amount in tuition fees can you present the certificates (3 yrs), associate degree, and diploma.

No a student has to register for FAST TRACK, which will take a minimum of 6 months to enroll in the Diploma. A student has to be resident for 1 year to get the Diploma.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

VALUE OF PROGRAM IN MUSIC

What is the Value of getting certification from this program?

Students of instrumental and vocal music spend years learning the art and perfecting the practices to perform their "Arangetram". This process might typically take about 6 to 7 years for a student. If a student were to pursue studies during this time, they should be able to complete post-graduate studies. However in the pursuit of learning music, students are not awarded degrees or receive certifications for their accomplishments.

To reward students for their efforts, APAA has designed a comprehensive curriculum in instrumental and vocal music along with Sangeetha Swara Laya and Alagappa University to offer a comprehensive academic program. Obtaining a certificate from a renowned University enhances the student's achievement portfolio and remains an asset for the student while applying to universities for collegiate education.

What are the requirements to enroll in the Certificate program?

Enrollment in the Certificate Program is open to all students, but to obtain a Certificate within one year a student would be required to have 2 to 3 years prior experience in Music. The practical requirement for the Certificate program are Sarali, Jantai ,Dhatu varisai. Alankarams and Geethams.

What do I do if I disagree with the Classical Style or have found something that doesn't appear to be covered?

When the language is not understood are their reference books elsewhere?

Yes though the terms are generally universal but musical terms translations should be available. Enquire with your teacher.

Do you take beginners and also what age students do you take?

Yes we do take beginners. In fact, most of the students are beginners and have not had any music lessons before. Students of all levels and ages are welcome. The Minimum age to enroll in the Certificate program is 8 years old.

A student must be capable of comprehending the text books by themselves and answer the questions in an examination. APAA will review and reserve the right to admit the student.

Do you need your own personal instrument to practice on like Veena, Mridangam and Violin in the home?

Yes it is certainly preferable to have an instrument of your own. Please check with your music center if they provide other facilities.

Can a student register for the Degree program directly if he / she has completed the practical requirements for the Diploma Program ?

No, in accordance with University guidelines a student is required to complete and pass all the required courses in the Certificate Program and then complete the same in the Diploma Program.

Is there an accelerated program for experienced students?

Yes, it is known as the FAST TRACK program. To enter this program the teacher should recommend and the student should provide their Arangetram DVD or performance DVD. APAA reserves the final right to admit a student to the FAST TRACK program.

Students enrolled in the FAST TRACK program can complete the Certificate program in 3 to 6 months but must pass the written and practical examinations for the course. The Diploma and Degree require mandatory 2 year duration to graduate.
